Ideas, Energy Generated at October Destination Midtown Meetings

More than 70 neighborhood residents, business leaders and city officials crowded into an OPS conference room October 14 to participate in the ongoing Destination Midtown project. Those present broke into small groups to exchange ideas concerning the issues brought up during the SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis.

All of the groups agreed that poor perception of the area and absentee landlords were perhaps the biggest issues to be resolved. Several groups suggested tighter building code enforcement for landlords who do not comply in a timely manner. It was also suggested that renters be better informed of their rights and the need to report unsafe or unsanitary conditions to authorities in order to make landlords comply. The perception of midtown being an unsafe, unkempt part of town was attributed to the lack of basic maintenance along the sidewalks and buildings on some of the main thoroughfares. The groups suggested that sprucing up the sidewalks and landscaping along these routes might help present a more positive image to commuters. In addressing the issues of crime, drugs, and prostitution in the area, several groups cited a need for a quicker response by law enforcement. It was suggested that neighborhood organizations could form stronger ties to the police department to resolve this issue.



Some of you spent a Saturday or Sunday to make or buy treats. I want you to know I appreciate it. I had several people apologize for not being more involved.

Volunteerism is where you identify an opportunity that motivates you to be involved, on an issue that is important to you. NOVEMBER | Workshop #2

Design Charrette #2 will refine the general concepts and design ideas that were developed during the first design charrette. Designers will examine, in detail, opportunities for mixed-use, pedestrian oriented development; infill development; public space development; and transportation improvements. The charrette will follow the same format as the previous charrette, and will focus on the study area's main corridor, the area between Dodge Street and Leavenworth Street.



As promised, the plans indicated a green-scape buffer and fence between neighborhood housing and the new parking lot development. Presently, the University has installed temporary boundary markers to eliminate any parking on the unpaved surface, which was observed last month. Work on the new lot is scheduled to begin in the spring of 2004.

"I'm very encouraged," said Mike Caban, a resident of the Gifford Park neighborhood. "One thing our group came up with is you can't work on the positive until you address the negative. This is a good start to doing that."

The focus of the October 15 meeting was how to achieve successful neighborhood business centers. After the crowd of more that 60 participants dispersed into small groups, each group was assigned the task of creating a neighborhood business center using 30-foot scale models that sat on the table before them, with each model representing a different part of midtown Omaha. James Moore, community design principal for HDR, gave the groups guidelines to consider. The ideas and fervor with which each group tackled this project pleased and impressed Doug Bisson of HDR, Destination Midtown project manager. "I think you can see the excitement level," he said. "Part of this whole concept was to get people taking about it and see the potential of their neighborhoods. I think we accomplished that tonight."
